Board Talk

Out with the old and in with the new. A very Happy New Year to You!

The Board met December 7 and discussed the budget for the upcoming year as well as reviewed the reports from the standing committees.

As the Board discussed the budget for the upcoming year it used the purpose, vision, and member priorities (2023 survey & workshop). along with the objectives of the strategic direction to guide its decisions. The process hasn't been completed but will be in January.

Financially we can report:

- Donations continue to be close to the budgeted amount
- Building and Parking Rental Income continues to be higher than budgeted
- Total income is higher than budgeted
- Total expenses are lower than budgeted. We are on target to have a small surplus by the year end.
- We have a good start on the Roof fund at \$12,488 but still need to raise \$ 28,000 or so before we can do the work. That total includes a 10% contingency amount.

The property committee has met with Gagnon of W. Gagnon Engineering so he could start a structural assessment. We're looking forward to the results of the assessment.

Kudos to the Bylaws Action Group for all the work its done to update the bylaws to use inclusive language.

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January Awareness Days

Principle 1: the inherent worth and dignity of every person

January marks new opportunities for Unitarians to live our principles. It is an opportunity to learn about the United Nations international framework to combat racism (2020), including discrimination, intolerance, and fear of people from other countries. Racism decreases opportunities for education, employment, basic health care, and access to justice.

January 4 - NATIONAL RIBBON SKIRT DAY in Canada.

First celebrated Wednesday, Jan. 4, 2023, this is an opportunity to showcase Indigenous culture and pride. For many, the ribbon skirt is a symbol of resilience. From 1884 to 1951, Cana-



da's Potlatch Law banned the clothing and ceremonial items of some Indigenous ceremonies.

January 24 – Global Education Day emphasizes the importance of education as a human right. More than half of youth worldwide lack basic math and literacy skills. Education offers children a way out of poverty and improves their future opportunities.

January 24th – World Day for African and Afro-descendant Culture within the United Nations International Decade for People of African Descent (2015-2024). We celebrate the many vibrant cultures of the African continent and African Diasporas around the world.

January 27th - International Day of Holocaust Remembrance, the liberation date of Auschwitz. Valuing the human rights of all people means Unitarians value the strength that comes with all types of diversity including religion, race, and gender. We value living in harmony without harassment or violence against those with different ethnicity or religious beliefs.

January 29th - National Day of Action Against Islamophobia. In Canada, we hope for diversity as one of our greatest strengths, yet we know that racism continues at unacceptable levels. There is urgent need to combat Islamophobia and all forms of racism in our community.

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Dismantling Racism and other Oppressions

Basic Income

Prince Edward Island has been leading the charge for Basic Income in Canada for a long time. In 2020, a cross-party committee tabled a report recommending the immediate implementation of a basic income guarantee; a call which was then adopted by the legislature and later reaffirmed by all party leaders in a joint letter. Now PEI has a plan, and a vision as the first jurisdiction to eradicate deep poverty in Canada.

The findings include:

- This provincial benefit would be available to all aged 18-64, decrease the poverty rate from 10% to 2%, and eliminate deep poverty.
- The benefit would provide a maximum of 85% of the poverty line: \$19,252 for a single adult or \$27,227 for a family of two adults. This would be reduced by fifty cents for every dollar earned.
- A significant portion of the cost would be offset through reductions to other benefits and the numerous long-term savings. The estimated gross cost of \$189 million could be fully financed in partnership with the federal government and moderate PEI tax increases.

The first steps forward include becoming aware and discovering the truth. Where are we as Unitarians? Are we doing enough to educate ourselves and inform others?



Protect the Planet

COP28

COP28 is the latest global Conference of the Parties (COP), the group of nations that forged the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change in 1992. This framework set out to address levels of global warming that are increasingly dangerous to planetary health.

The theme of COP 28 was *Unite*. *Act. Deliver*. COP28 is now over. The **Environmental Defense Canada** team outlined what was achieved. Meaningful progress will help ensure a safe future.

- For the first time ever, countries around the world agreed on the need to transition away from fossil fuels.
- A loss and damage fund was established to support countries least responsible for the climate crisis but most affected by climate disasters.
- A Global Methane Pledge launched to reduce methane leaks from oil and gas production to near zero by 2030.
- Canada announced (Dec.7, 2023) its much-awaited framework for creating a plan to reduce oil and gas carbon pollution.
 - The framework proposes a cap-and-trade system that sets a regulated limit on emissions from the sector (under the *Canadian Environmental Protection Act*).

 - The framework proposes decline in GHG emissions at a pace and scale to meet net-zero by 2050
 - The framework accounts for technically feasible emissions reductions and forecasted global oil and gas demand
 - The framework intends to minimize additional administrative requirements to the extent possible.
 - The framework commits to ongoing monitoring and regular reviews of meeting the goal of net-zero GHG emissions by 2050.

The foundation will be 10 years in April of 2024 even through very unsafe times in Burundi. They want to celebrate in a big way by going back to their initial goal of supporting vulnerable children and their families. \$250 will support a family's educational needs and income generating activities.

Greeting from the Board of Trustees

Board President Kiersten Moore recently invited UUs to lean into rest, joy, and rejuvenation during the holiday season just past. Although January is upon us, the thoughts about making meaningful connections and love apply all year.

I find December one of the more complicated times of the year. My desire to make Christmas morning magic for my kids with a pile of beautifully wrapped packages tied up with bows competes with my wish to smash the machine of commercial capitalism. What do I do with the stress that these diametrically opposed urges create? I turn to meaning-making, real connections with the people I love, and constant reminders to myself to slow down and pay attention to what enhances joy.

I am put in mind of a story that highlights how much more people mean to us than stuff. A couple years after we moved to BC, we flew our family of five to Nebraska to have Christmas with my mom. My brother and his family drove down from Minneapolis and it was the first time we had all been together for Christmas in many years. At that time we were living on one income in Vancouver—so with the added space and money restrictions of flying, presents for the kids were very purposefully thought out, small, and limited in number. However my brother driving down in a minivan was not so limited.

In the moment of that week together there were many times that I felt the material discrepancies between our two families. There was indeed a large pile of packages under the tree, and my children finished opening their share of gifts much sooner than their cousins. I felt that my careful weighing of fairness in gift giving between my children was blown to naught and my older two were left feeling disappointed by Christmas morning. I strove to emphasize the gift of spending this time with family we hardly ever get to see, while inwardly feeling devastated that they felt let down.

Fast forward to last year and in conversation with my child I discovered that visits to Nebraska ranked high in their positive memories of family and Christmas. They wondered when we would get to go back again. What had stayed in memory were the connections and the gift that I knew all along was most important, the love.

My hope for you this December, whatever you celebrate and in whatever way, is that you take time to slow down and identify what is most important to you, what brings you closer to loved ones, what sparks joy together—and lean into those things. Everyone deserves rest, joy, and rejuvenation; these are the things that are life giving.

Sharing Our Faith 2024

The Sharing Our Faith program provides funds for congregational initiatives which enhance ministry, aid congregational projects and outreach, and enrich the Unitarian Universalist movement in Canada. The fund consists of these monies, supplemented by a Foundation Fund administered by the First Unitarian Congregation of Toronto. The funds are allocated in the form of grants to congregations for growth projects and initiatives.

In the past 3 years, there were national online services for Sharing Our Faith. In 2024, we are returning to local services. Congregations hold a "Sharing Our Faith" worship service focused on the UU faith in Canada, with a special collection for the Sharing Our Faith fund. The Unitarian Fellowship of Regina will hold a service in early spring with a special collection for Sharing Our Faith.
