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CUC Board Member Visits the Unitarian Fellowship of Regina-August 2025

On August 24, 2025, Ilara Stfaniuk-Gaudet visited the Fellowship as the Western Representative to the Board of the Canadian Unitarian Council. Ilara is from Saskatchewan and now lives in Edmonton where she is studying theology and art therapy.

Ilara explained that in recent years, larger numbers of Unitarians associate online and in informal groups rather than in formal congregations. The CUC is grappling with how this could change the national organization.

At present, the CUC is using the metaphor of an ecosystem in which all parts function independently while supporting each other. The ecosystem metaphor helps to explain all the different ways in which Unitarians relate to each other. This approach might strengthen our ability to support each other as we align our actions with our Unitarian Principles. The focus of the CUC Board is on Principle 7:

"Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part."

Ilara led us to consider how our local Fellowship functions as a caring community that can achieve more together than individuals can achieve separately. It was a heart-warming exercise that left those attending with a greater appreciation of this caring community.

On Friendship

In the Summer edition of



The Chalice, "I explained who the prophet is in Kahlil Gibran's book *The Prophet* and why the prophet is imparting his wisdom to the people of the island before he leaves them.

This month, I am focusing on the Prophet's view on one particular topic. A young man asks him, "Speak to us of friendship." The prophet replies extensively on what friendship is, but he also speaks briefly of what friendship is not: "What is your friend that you should seek him with hours to kill?" He immediately continues that you should "seek him always with hours to live, for it is his to fill your need, but not your emptiness."

The prophet then states that there is work and reward in cultivating friendship: "He is your field, which you sow with love and reap with thanksgiving."

He stresses that you do not have to agree with everything your friend says: "When your friend speaks his mind, you fear not the 'nay' in your own mind, nor do you withhold the 'ay'.

Friends do not always have to be together: "When you part from your friend, you grieve not; for that which you love most in him may be clearer in his absence, as the mountain to the climber is clearer from the plain."

You should not just share your problems with your friend, but also your excitement and ecstasy: "If he must know the ebb of your tide, let him know its flood also."

Fun and happiness are also important in friendship: "And in the sweetness of friendship, let there be laughter and sharing of pleasures. For in the dew of little things, the heart finds its morning and is refreshed."

- 1645 Jeanne Mance founds the first Canadian hospital
- 1867 Emily Stowe, a Unitarian is the first woman licensed to practice medicine in Canada
- 1916 Manitoba is the province in which women first gained the right to vote
- 1921 Agnes McPhail is the first Canadian woman elected to the House of Commons
- 1960 All Canadian women, including Indigenous women, given the right to vote
- 1993 Jean Augustine is the first Black Canadian woman elected to the House of Commons

Protecting the Planet

Fire and smoke have been on our minds and in the air this summer. And for some it has meant the destruction of their health, home, and a way of life. Learning more could benefit us all. Here are a few references that you might find of interest.

- For a central source of wildfire information, try the Canadian government site 'wildfires'. This includes links to the provincial wildfire maps, information on wildfire smoke distribution, and background data
- For fire prevention and mitigation, Firesmart programs are front & centre. <u>FireSmart - At Home</u> has prevention and mitigation measures for homeowners and communities.
- A Canadian perspective can be found in the book Fire Weather: A True Story from a Hotter World. Also published as Fire Weather: On the Front Lines of a Burning World. This a 2023 book by Canadian-American journalist John Vaillant. The book details the 2016 Fort McMurray wildfire which led to the evacuation of more than 88,000 residents of Fort McMurray and the destruction of much of the town. (Source: Wikipedia)

All the Quiet Places: A Novel (2021) by Brian Thomas Issac

Based in rural BC, Syilx tribe. "... Eddie Toma's passage through the truly ugly parts of this world is met, like an antidote, or perhaps a compensation, by his remarkable awareness of its beauty. This is a writer who understands youth, and how to tell a story." —Gil Adamson. All the Quiet Places is the story of what can happen when every adult in a person's life has been affected by colonialism. Winner of the 2022 Indigenous Voices Awards. Published Prose in English Prize. Shortlisted for the 2022 Amazon Canada First Novel Award and many other awards

A Tale of Monstrous Extravagance: Imagine Multilingualism (2015) by Tomson Highway

Raised speaking Dene, Inuktitut, and Latin, as an adult Highway has learned many languages including music as a way of communicating. This is a rollicking read through the renowned playwright, author and performer's life through the lens of the languages.

Bad Pharma (2012) by Ben Goldmaker

This book explains that much information is withheld by drug companies. For example, even doctors are not made aware of all drug side effects.

Depletion and Abundance (2008) by Sharon Astik

This book explores how to build resilient homes and communities with a focus on the "informal economy" of family and local community, emphasizing self-reliance, sustainable living ... with actions to give you hope.

Illusions: The Adventures of a Reluctant Messiah (1989) by Richard Bach.

If you take to the air, you might discover the ageless truths that give our souls wings: that people don't need airplanes to soar... It is about letting go to see what is around the corner.

Killers of a Certain Age (2022) by Deanna Raybourn

Fun with aging female assassins.

One Day Everyone Will Always Have Been Against This (2025) by Omar El Akkad.

This book is a respected exploration of racism, genocide, and Gaza. New York Times Bestseller

The No. 1 Ladies' Detective Agency Series. (25 novels written 1998 to 2024) by Alexander McCall Smith.

These novels draw you in to a peaceful, slow pace. Set in Botswana and featuring the character Mma Precious Ramotswe.

YouTube webinar

The Making of Modern Ukraine (2022) by Timothy Snyder, Yale

This is part of 21 lectures of geographic and military history across Europe. It explains Ukraine was a cultural center and explores interconnection with Christianity and commercial slavery.







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Reconciliation Ripples

Congratulations to Cadmus Delorme

(B.Admin, MPA, ICD.D) on being named the 10th Chancellor of the University of Regina. His three-year term begins on July 1, 2025.

Delorme has been affiliated with the University of Regina for more than 15 years in various capacities—undergraduate student (through First Nations University of Canada), Master's student (2013), and most recently the Chair of the Board of Governors.

In addition to his academic and professional accomplishments, Delorme is the former Chief of the Cowessess First Nation and founder of OneHoop Advisory Services where he contributes significantly to community development, economic growth, and reconciliation initiatives. <u>See more here</u>.

Congratulations to the Honourable Russ Mirasty who received an honorary Doctor of Laws honoris causa (LLD) during Spring 2025 Convocation, University of Regina. Although best known as the first Indigenous Lieutenant Governor of Saskatchewan, Mr. Mirasty also made a lasting impact in policing and community service. He is a fluent Cree speaker, member of the Lac La Ronge Indian Band, and has contributed a lifetime to public service, leadership, and community dedication. More information here.

Congratulations to the Honourable Dr. Lillian Eva Quan Dyck, O.C. who received an honorary Doctor of Science honoris causa (DSc) from the University of Regina at the Spring 2025 Convocation. Born in North Battleford, Dr. Dyck is of Cree and Chinese heritage and is a member of the George Gordon First Nation. She pursued higher education with determination, earning a BA in chemistry in 1966, an honours degree in biochemistry in 1968, a master's in science in 1970, and a PhD in biological psychiatry in 1981—each from the University of Saskatchewan. She also holds honorary doctorates from Cape Breton University and Trent University. Dr Dyck retired from the Senate in 2020. See more here.

Exciting News

The Fellowship's Reconciliation Action Group is learning more about First Nations near us. We are on high alert to learn about exciting events like the one described here. The Muscowpetung Saulteaux Nation is located 60 km north of Regina and 40 km west of Fort Qu'Appelle. Here is a story about what it looks like when we strive together toward reconciliation.

July 25, 2025, Chief Melissa Tavita of the Muscowpetung Saulteaux Nation and the Honourable Rebecca Alty, Minister of Crown-Indigenous Relations, announced a settlement agreement resolving the Nation's Agricultural Benefits claim, also known as a Cows and Plows settlement.

Canada will pay nearly \$99 million in compensation to the First Nation for the Government's failure to fulfill its Treaty 4 obligations to provide farming equipment, crop seeds, and livestock.

These agricultural benefits were meant to facilitate Muscowpetung Saulteaux Nation's transition to a strong, self-sustaining community through farming. However, as a result of Canada's failure to meet its Treaty obligations, the Nation did not have the agricultural assistance it needed to support its members.

The funds will be used for various community needs, including housing, infrastructure upgrades, and youth programming. The settlement will be strategically allocated to uplift the Nation and support long-term prosperity. Key investments include:

- Housing Development: Significant funding will be dedicated to addressing the Nation's housing backlog. Modern, culturally-aligned homes will be constructed to ensure safe and dignified living conditions for families on-reserve.
- Infrastructure Upgrades: Investment in road systems, community facilities, and connectivity will strengthen the Nation's ability to support future development and improve quality of life.
- Water System Improvements: Ensuring clean and reliable drinking water remains a top priority. This funding will be used to upgrade water-treatment systems and ensure every home has access to safe water.
- Youth Programming: The future of Muscowpetung lies in its youth. New programming will focus on cultural education, sports, leadership development, and mental wellness—empowering the next generation of leaders.
- Per-Capita Distribution: Every adult member of Muscowpetung will receive a one-time payment of \$40,000. For Nation members under the age of 18, the funds will be placed in a secure trust account, earning 4% annually, to be accessed once they reach adulthood. This ensures that the benefits of the settlement are shared today and into the future.

Specific claims like this one deal with past wrongs against First Nations and are resolved through alternative dispute resolution processes (Specific Claims Tribunal Act of 2009). Over the past five years (April 1, 2020, to May 31, 2025), 229 claims have been resolved for nearly \$15.1 billion in compensation. To date, 53 agricultural benefits claims have been resolved in Treaties 4, 5, 6, and 10, for more than \$6.9 billion in compensation.
